


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GOODWILL MESSAGE FOR THE 65TH ANNIVERSARY OF CHRIST THE KING CHURCH, ACCRA.

Greetings & Introductory Rites

The rites of dedication begin with the congregation gathered at the entrance of the Church. The welcome address is given by the Chairman of the Parish Pastoral Council.

The Archbishop greets and addresses the people with the following words:-

ARCHBISHOP- The grace and peace of God be with all of you in this Holy place.

ALL - And with your spirit.

ARCHBISHOP- Brothers and Sisters in Christ, this is a day of rejoicing. We have come together to dedicate and consecrate this Church by offering within it the sacrifice of Christ. May we open our hearts and minds to receive His word with faith. May our fellowship born in the font of baptism and sustained at the one table of the Lord become the one temple of His Spirit, as we gather around His Altar in Love. "Go within His gates giving thanks and enter His court with songs of praise".

Preceded by the Cross Bearer, the Archbishop and the assembly enter the Church singing songs of praise led by the Choir.

Entry of the Archbishop: Ecce Sacerdos Magnum/CH 5-Around the Altar we sing.

BLESSING OF WATER ARCHBISHOP- Let us pray.

Brothers and Sisters in Christ, in this solemn rite of dedication and consecration, we ask the Lord our God to bless this water created by His hand. It is a sign of our repentance, a reminder of our baptism, and a symbol of the cleansing of these Walls and His Altar. May the Grace of God help us to remain faithful members of His Church; open to the Spirit we have received.

All pray in silence.

ARCHBISHOP- God of Mercy, you call every Creature to the light of life, and surround us with such great love that when we stray you continually lead us back to Christ, our head. For you established an inheritance of such mercy, that those sinners, who pass through water made sacred, die with Christ and rise restored as members of His eternal covenant. Bless this water; sanctify it. As it is sprinkled upon us and throughout this Church, make it a sign of the saving waters of baptism by which we become one in Christ the temple of your Spirit. May all here today, all those in days to come who will celebrate your mysteries in this Church, be united at last in the Holy city of your peace. We ask this in the name of Jesus the Lord.

SPRINKLING OF WATER

The Archbishop sprinkles the people and the walls with Holy water. On his return to the Sanctuary, he sprinkles the Altar and returns to His seat. He then prays with his hands joined.

ARCHBISHOP- May God the Father of Mercies dwell in this house of prayer. May the grace of the Holy Spirit cleanse us for we are the temple of His presence.

ARCHBISHOP- Saints of God you have been enthroned at the foot of God's Altar, pray for us to our Lord Jesus Christ.

Prayer of Dedication Continues

ARCHBISHOP- Father in Heaven, source of holiness and true purpose, it is right that we praise and glorify your name. For today we come before you, to dedicate to your lasting service, this house of prayer, this temple of worship.

ARCHBISHOP- This home in which we are nourished by your Word and your Sacraments, there is, reflected the mystery of the Church. The Church is fruitful, made holy by the blood of Christ; a bride made radiant with His glory, a virgin splendid in the wholeness of her faith, a mother blessed through the power of the Spirit.

The Church is holy, Your chosen vineyard; its branches envelope the world; its tendrils, carried on the tree of the cross, reach up to the Kingdom of Heaven. The Church is favoured, the dwelling place of God on earth. A temple built of living stones, founded on the apostles with Jesus Christ its corner stone.

The Church is exalted. A city set on a mountain; a beacon to the whole world. Bright with the Glory of the Lamb, and echoing the prayers of her saints. Lord, send your Spirit from heaven to make this Church an ever holy place, and this Altar a ready table for the sacrifice of Christ. Here may the water of baptism overwhelm the shame of sin. Here may your people die to sin and live again through grace as your children.

Here may your children, gathered around your Altar, celebrate the memorial of the Pascal Lamb, and be fed at the table of Christ's word and Christ's body. Here may prayers, the Church's banquet, resound through heaven and earth as a plea for *the* world's salvation. Here may the poor find justice, the victim of oppression true freedom. From here may the whole world clothed in the dignity of the children of God, enter with gladness Your City of Peace.

We ask this Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son who lives and reigns with you and Holy Spirit, one God forever and ever.

Anointing of the Altar and the Walls of the Church

The archbishop removes his chasuble and puts on a linen gremial. He anoints the Altar in these words:

ARCHBISHOP- We anoint this Altar and this building. May God in His power make them holy, visible signs of the mystery of Christ in His Church.

He pours chrism in the Altar beginning in the middle, followed by the four corners, and smears it over the entire surface.

Incensation of the Altar and the Walls of the Church

After the rite of anointing, the brazier is placed on the Altar for burning of incense or aromatic gums. The Archbishop puts incense into the brazier saying:

ARCHBISHOP- Lord may our prayers ascend as incense in your sight. As this building is filled with fragrance, so may Your Church fill the world with fragrance of Christ.

Lighting of the Altar Candles and the Church Candles

The Archbishop gives a minister a lighted candle and says:

ARCHBISHOP- Light of Christ, shine forth in the church and bring all nations to the fullness of truth.

The Archbishop takes his seat while the torchbearer goes to the Altar and lights the candles. This is followed by the festive lighting. All candles and lamps are lit as sign of rejoicing.

REV. FR. ANDREW CAMPBELL (SVD) Parish Priest, Christ the King Catholic Church

"The Lord had done great things for me, Holy is His name". (Lk 1:19)

Christ the King Catholic Church was officially established on Trinity Sunday, May 22nd, 1951 by its founder and first priest, Rev. Father Charles Erb; with a total of six hundred (600) worshipers. It was dedicated and consecrated by Bishop Oliver Bowers as the fourth mission station in the Diocese (now Archdiocese) of Accra.

Those whose sweat and toil helped found and construct this Church handed down to us and those who served God through it faithfully throughout the years as members, leaders and pastors have made it possible for it to be a great and strong parish spiritually and socially.

Spiritually, the Holy Mass has become the center of our faith and lives at Christ the King Church. Our new splendid granite altar with new baptismal font and lecterns will help us appreciate more, the greatness of the Holy Mass and help us to worship and adore the Lord in total reverence and humility.

To cope with the rapid growth in the population of the parish and ensure that all home bound and sick parishioners receive Holy Communion at least once a week, Christ the King Parish enrolled initially, five (5) parishioners for training at Sowutoum Major Seminary, to assist the

Priests in the distribution of Holy Communion. This was when the Extra Ordinary Ministers of Holy Communion began their work in the Archdiocese of Accra in 2001. The number of Extra Ordinary Ministers of Holy Communion currently stands at nineteen (19).

As a parish, we also thank God for the wonderful treasure and gift of the Adoration Chapel. Thousands of worshipers come regularly, both young and old, to adore Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament. The Adoration Chapel is one of the greatest joys of my 45 years of priesthood in Ghana. When I see people come early morning, at noon, in the evening and spending the night in prayer, I feel the presence of God all around us.

Furthermore, devotional societies have sprung up and perhaps for the reward of ceaseless prayers for vocations, our Church has been blessed with eight (8) of our sons and a DAUGHTER being ordained to the priesthood and called to Religious Service.

Sister Julia Anokye: The first Religious from Christ the King Parish.

Sister Julia Anokye was with Christ the King Parish for about twenty (20) years. Sr. Julia was very instrumental in organizing the Christ the King Praesidium of the Legion of Mary. She belongs to the Sisters Hospitallers of the Sacred Heart of Jesus; and is currently working at Holy Child Clinic at Fijai near Secondi in the Western Region of Ghana.

It is our hope that the lives of these Priests and our Sister, will continue to inspire our youth to answer God's calling.

Moreover, since its inception, the Parish has become known for its higher level of social conscience, reaching out to the poor and the underprivileged. Christ the King Parish will continue to live up to its responsibilities in promoting pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical mission of the Catholic Church in the Parish and beyond. We will strive harder

to identify the priorities of the Parish to focus on and address issues pertaining to the Youth, Catholic Faith Formation, New Evangelization and outreach to non-involved and non-participating parishioners.

Christ the King Catholic Parish, has had two outstation Churches namely, Mary Mother of Good Counsel Church, established in December 1991 (Now a Parish), with Rev. Fr. David Arko Amissah as the Parish Priest, and Divine Mercy Catholic Church, Okponglo in August 2004; currently with Rev. Farther Destiny Amenuvor as the Priest-in-Charge. Today being the Holy Trinity Sunday, falls exactly the same date and day on which this Parish was established. As we rededicate and reconsecrate our Church building today, let us rededicate our lives to Christ the King.

We pray that as a Parish, within the Extraordinary year of Mercy, we will continue to strive to be a faith community whose gratitude to God's countless blessings is manifested in our prayerful relationship with Jesus Christ.

On behalf of the clergy of Christ the King Parish, I wish parishioners a Blessed 65th Anniversary Celebrations.





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








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JUBILEE YEAR OF MERCY PRAYER

HUMBLE BEGINNING CHRIST THE KING CHURCH

Christ the King Catholic Church started in a small chapel with a total of six hundred (600) members; under Rev. Fr. Charles Erb, founder and first Parish Priest. He organized church services on weekends and eventually, in 1950 secured a plot of land within the military zone at Switch Back Road for the construction of a church. By the grace of God, Christ the King Church building was completed and dedicated by Bishop Joseph Oliver Bowers on Trinity Sunday, May 22, 1951 as the fourth Mission Station in Accra.

The nature of Christ the King Church from inception – priest and congregation alike – tended to evolve. In the early days, the congregation mostly comprised of Expatriate Catholics and locals who lived within the vicinity of the Switch Back Road. In the late Gold Coast era, there was a large population of Catholic Lebanese Traders and Merchants in Accra and other towns. There was therefore a need for a priest of their own. In response to their request, two Maronite Lebanese Priests arrived in Accra in December, 1951 and were hosted by Christ the King Church. They settled and used the Church as the headquarters of the Maronite Lebanese Catholics in Ghana. Eventually, they built their residence at their site at Osu and moved out in 1956.

During the era of independence, the European population in Christ the King Church dwindled considerably. On the other hand, the Ghanaian population grew rapidly. Parishioners were now mostly Senior Officers of the Army, Police and the Civil Service.

The Church building became smaller for the increasing number of parishioners, which by that time was in the thousands. It was therefore time to build a bigger church.

Many challenges were faced in getting this off the ground. In the period of Fr. J.H. Lauck as Parochial Administrator, plans were submitted for the new Church but several amendments and alterations necessarily ensued.

Subsequently, when the contract for the construction of the new church was finally awarded in 1965, work was brought to a halt. This development arose because the area, currently referred to as the "Revolutionary Square" and its immediate environs, were earmarked as the helicopter base by the then Government.

However, after the 1966 coup d'état, the green light was given for the Church project to proceed. In no time, the new and present church was completed and dedicated by the Bishop Oliver Bowers on October 29, 1967.

Christ the King Church attained the status of a Parish under Fr. Lauck's tenure (September 8, 1965). Our Lady of Fatima Grotto was built during his term. This was to increase devotion to Mother Mary. On the first Saturday of every month, various societies and parishes in the city would congregate at the Grotto to pray the Holy Rosary and other devotions of the Blessed and finally climax it with the celebration of the Holy Eucharist.

Fr. M. Lessage was appointed as the Parish Priest from 1969 to 1975. Fr. Amos Friersichs later took over from 1975 to 1980.

Very Rev. Fr. Martin Wels (SVD) took over as Parish Priest in 1980 and during his tenure as pastor, Christ the King became known for its outreach to the poor and the under privileged. The Christ the King Hall was officially blessed and opened on September 27, 1986.

Rev. Fr, Stephen Adu Kwaning (August 1994-October 2006) became the first Ghanaian Parish Priest of Christ the King Church. In May 2005, he was named as a prelate of Honor by His Holiness Pope Benedict XVI and invested as a Monsignor on November 30, 2005.


Rev. Fr. Prince Emmanuel Adelaayitar took over from Rev. Fr. Stephen Adu-Kwaning in October, 2006 and later left for sabbatical studies in Rome in June 2009. During his time as Parish Priest, Rev. Fr. Adelaayitar played a key role in the implementation of the Vitus Dery Educational Fund. He also started the Tuesday Teaching and the Marian Feast in the Month of October.

Rev. Fr. Andrew Campbell was appointed the Parish Priest of Christ the King Church in July 2009. Christ the King Parish has seen some significant face lift under the tenure of Rev. Fr. Campbell. These include the recreational grounds, refurbishment of the Christ the King church building and the Parish Hall, Adoration Chapel Complex, Sick Bay for both church and school. The church has also undertaken a great deal of outreach programs.

Early Life and Education

Jorge Mario Bergoglio graduated from a Technical School as a Chemical Technician before beginning training at the Diocesan Seminary of Villa Devoto. In March 1958, he entered the Novitiate of the Society of Jesus. Bergoglio taught Literature and Psychology at Immaculate Conception College in Santa Fé in 1964 and 1965, and also taught the same subjects at the Colegio del Salvatore in Buenos Aires in 1966. He studied Theology and received a degree from the Colegio of San José from 1967 to 1970. He finished his Doctoral Thesis in Theology in Freiburg, Germany in 1986.

Entering Priesthood

Ordained as a priest in December 1969, Bergoglio began serving as Jesuit Provincial of Argentina in 1973. He is reported to have said that initially, his mother did not support his decision to enter the Priesthood, despite the fact that she was a devout Catholic. By the time he was ordained; however, his mother had accepted his calling and asked for his blessing at the end of his ordination ceremony. He later returned to his alma mater, the Colegio of San José, where he served as Rector (1980-86) and a Professor of Theology.

On May 20, 1992, Bergoglio was named Titular Bishop of Auca and Auxiliary of Buenos Aires. In February 1998, he became Archbishop of Buenos Aires, succeeding Antonio Quarracino. Three years later, in February 2001, he was elevated to Cardinal by Pope John Paul II.In 2005, he was named President of the Bishops' Conference of Argentina, serving in that position until 2011. After Pope John Paul II's death in April 2005, Bergoglio reportedly, received the second-most votes in the 2005 Papal Conclave; Pope Benedict XVI (Joseph Ratzinger) was chosen as Pope John Paul's successor.

On March 13, 2013, at the age of 76, Jorge Bergoglio was named the 266th Pope of the Roman Catholic Church—becoming the first citizen from the Americas, the first non-European and first Jesuit Priest to be named Pope. He adopted the name Pope Francis (he took the title after St. Francis of Assisi of Italy). Prior to the 2013 Papal Conclave, Pope Francis had served as both Archbishop and Cardinal for more than 12 years.

The tone of his Papacy, which has been admired globally, was established long before his elevation to the Church's highest position; however, when he was named to that post, the media quickly picked up on stories of his humility. News circulated about the fact that he returned to the boarding house where he had been staying to pay his bill personally, rather than send an assistant, and that he would choose to live in a simple two-room apartment rather than the luxurious Papal accommodations in the Vatican's Apostolic Palace. In choosing to live more simply, Pope Francis broke a tradition that had been upheld by Popes for more than a century.

Addressing a crowd of tens of thousands in St. Peter's Square, in the Vatican City in Rome, Italy, after his selection by the Conclave, Pope Francis stated, "As you know, the duty of the Conclave was to appoint a Bishop of Rome. It seems to me that my brother Cardinals have chosen one who is from faraway... Here I am. I would like to thank you for your embrace."

After the results of the 2013 Papal Conclave were announced, U.S. President, Barack Obama issued a statement about the new Pope: "As the first Pope from the Americas, his selection also speaks to the strength and vitality of a region that is increasingly shaping our world, and alongside millions of Hispanic Americans, those of us in the United States share the joy of this historic day." It was not long after assuming the Papacy that Pope Francis began offering more nuanced views and interpretations on key social issues about which the Church holds pronounced doctrinal views. He has not shied away from elaborating on those views, and sound bites such as "Who am I to judge?", a comment he made referring to homosexuality, have served to portray him as a compassionate conservative whose views are often considered progressive compared to those of his predecessors.



In September 2013, Pope Francis called for others to join him in praying for peace in Syria. The Pontiff held a special vigil in St. Peter's Square on September 7, which

was attended by an estimated 100,000 people. According to the Catholic News Service, Pope Francis told the crowd that "When man thinks only of himself. . .[and] permits himself to be captivated by the idols of dominion and power..., [t]hen the door opens to violence, indifference, and conflict." The Pope implored those involved in the conflict to find a peaceful solution. Leave behind the selfinterest that hardens your heart, overcome the indifference that makes your heart insensitive towards others, conquer your deadly reasoning, and open yourself dialogue and reconciliation."

Later that month, Pope Francis gave a revealing interview to an Italian Jesuit publication called La Civiltà Cattolica. He explained that religious dialogue must be broader in scope, not simply focused on such issues as homosexuality and abortion. "We have to find a new balance; otherwise, even the moral edifice of the Church is likely to fall like a house of cards, losing the freshness and fragrance of the Gospel, the Pope said. "The proposal of the Gospel must be simpler, profound, and radiant. It is from this proposition that the moral consequences then flow." In early December 2013, Pope Francis gave an "apostolic exhortation," an address calling for big changes in the Catholic Church, including rethinking long-held but antiquated customs.

"I prefer a Church which is bruised, hurting, and dirty because it has been out on the streets, rather than a Church which is unhealthy from being confined and from clinging to its own security," he stated. "I do not want a Church concerned with being at the center and then ends by being caught up in a web of obsessions and procedures."

In March, 2014, it was announced that Pope Francis had been nominated for the 2014 Nobel Peace Prize. He did not receive this honor, but he continued to devote his time to reaching out to Catholics around the world. During that summer, Pope Francis went on his first visit to Asia. He spent five days in South Korea in August. On his return trip from South Korea, Pope Francis discussed his own mortality with the press. "Two or three years and then I'll be off to my Father's house," he said, according to a report in The Guardian. He also suffered a personal loss around that same time after several members of his family were killed in a car accident in Argentina.

Pope Francis continued his pattern of deep engagement with both political and environmental conflicts around the world. He spoke out against global abuses and the misuse of political and economic power, lamenting the disappearances and suspected murders of 43 students in Mexico; the dangers and losses of life caused by immigration; financial mismanagement within the Church itself; and sexual abuse.

His decision to crack down on Church corruption and excommunicate members of the Mafia were hailed by Catholics and non-Catholics alike, though they also caused him to receive death threats.

He tackled other political blockades too, bringing together Presidents Raul Castro, of Cuba, and President Barack Obama, of the United States, in a historic meeting that precipitated significant foreign policy changes. Finally, his ambitious schedule of travel continued, with visits to Paraguay,

Bolivia, and Ecuador to have beatifications. To date, he has beatified more than three dozen people, including Oscar Romero, a priest from El Salvador who was assassinated in 1980 because of his espousal of liberation theology and his activism to protect marginalized people.

In September 2015, Pope Francis continued to stir up the status quo in the Catholic Church when he announced that priests around the world will be allowed to forgive the "sin of abortion" during a "Year of Mercy," which starts December 8, 2015 and ends November 20, 2016. The Pope wrote about this act of compassion in a letter, stating: "I think in particular of all the women who have resorted to abortion. I am well aware of the pressure that has led them to this decision. I know that it is an existential and moral ordeal. I have met so many women who bear in their heart the scar of this agonizing and painful decision. What has happened is profoundly unjust; yet only understanding the truth of it can enable one not to lose hope."

He added: "The forgiveness of God cannot be denied to one who has repented, especially when that person approaches the Sacrament of Confession with a sincere heart in order to obtain reconciliation with the Father. For this reason too, I have decided, notwithstanding anything to the contrary, to concede to all priests for the Jubilee Year the discretion to absolve of the sin of abortion those who have procured it and who, with contrite heart, seek forgiveness for it



Christ the king Church became my Parish for a short time (2003-2005) when I was appointed the Director of the Youth Formation Center, Lashibi. I was in Residence at Christ the King to enable me take care of the newly established centre from there. Msgr. Stephen Adu Kwaning was then the Parish Priest. With other priests, we enjoyed fraternity, love and friendship, an atmosphere that brought us together to serve the Parishioners with joy and in unity. Sunday see one or another in the Church for the First and/or second Mass, the Children's Mass in the Parish hall, or driving down to Mother of Good Counsel, or to Okponglo. Confessions were regular on Saturdays and overwhelming on first Saturdays when we welcomed several Catholics from other parishes for our Grotto Devotions.

Nevertheless, my work at the Youth Center was not disturbed. There were so many challenges at this new plot which should be developed for the training of our youth. In attempt to tackle these challenges and difficulties I wrote to all Parishes and the three deaneries (East, West & Tema-Battor) for help.

When the help was not coming, I appealed to the Parishioners (about eleven) taking interest in

the center and its future. Soon they formed themselves into a group which soon became

known as "Friends of the Youth Center". They were to assist me in making appeals to individuals and groups for help. I also appealed to them to help me organize "fund fairs" to raise money for the project, my priority being fencing the entire plots as a starting point. Thus, they helped me to plan a big fund fair which included raffles. Some of the youth from the parish and Mother of Good Counsel as well as from Corpus Christi periodically helped in clearing weeds on the plots.

Unfortunately, before the planned fund fair for the Parish could take place I was sent to St. Theresa's Parish, Kaneshie, to be Parish Priest. This necessitated later on a change in venue, from Christ the King to Kaneshie R. C. School. Through the continuous support of the "Friends of the Youth Center" the fund fair at Kaneshie was very successful. To crown it all, a Parishioner of Christ the King, to make the Fencing project a success donated to the project five million cedis (now GH¢500.00). The project was accordingly completed to the glory of God. I always consider my passing through Christ the King as a



great opportunity for great discoveries. And I always thank the Lord for the gift of these benefactor "Friends of the Youth Center". I am therefore greatly delighted to send the Parish this message of congratulations. The Parish and her faithful in many way have helped many people in many ways. The Parish, for instance, takes care of the faithful from many Parishes who would like to have their Holy Mass on regular basis before going to their place of work.

n 4th September, 2016, Pope Francis would declare Blessed Theresa of Kolkata (Mother Theresa), a Saint at the Vatican. The date was announced on 15th March, 2016 during an "Ordinary Public Consistory", a meeting of the Pope, Cardinals and Promoters of Sainthood Causes that formally ends the Sainthood process.

Mother Theresa was born to an ethnic Albanian family in Skopje (now part of Macedonia). She went to India in 1929 as Sister of Loreto and became an Indian citizen in 1947. She was known for her ministration to the sick and the dying in some vulnerable communities and neighborhoods in the world. She founded the Missionaries of Charity in 1950.

Invariably, it is precedent—though not an official rule,—that five years pass after a person's death before his or her Sainthood is considered. Once five years have passed, there is a logical line of verifications that the Catholic Church grants.

In keeping with the above principle, no sooner had Mother Theresa died in 1997 Pope John Paul II, waived the usual five-year waiting period and allowed the opening of the process to declare her Sainthood. She was Beatified in 2003

In anticipation of Mother Teresa's Canonization in September this year, we take a look at the stages involved in Becoming a Saint. According to Catholic doctrine, the Church does not choose Saints — God does. God consecrates a person's Sainthood the moment he or she enters Earthly Sainthood is thus, merely a posthumous, mortal recognition of what is believed to be God's divine will. As one might expect, the Catholic Church does not take lightly the process of determining whom God has and has not sanctified. It is indeed quite a stretch of human power for one to claim to understand God's undisclosed intentions. There is subsequently a long, deliberate set of hurdles that a person's legacy must face before he or she is recognized as a Saint, complete with multiple stages and titles which charter one's progress in the overall pursuit of Sainthood.

BELOW ARE THE FOUR OFFICIAL RUNGS THAT AN ASPIRING SAINT MUST CLIMB BEFORE HUMANITY ACKNOWLEDGES HIS OR HER SANCTITY.

1. SERVANT OF GOD

The first esteemed title granted by the Church in the canonization process is "Servant of God." Someone must nominate a candidate for official consideration to a Bishop, who then determines the candidate's viability. If the Bishop determines that the nominee is a viable candidate for sainthood, then the candidate completes the first rung of Canonization and acquires his or her first title.

2. VENERABLE

Each officially sanctioned Servant of God then pursues the next title: "Venerable". The candidate's life is investigated, analyzed, and contextualized by a Vatican Committee called the Congregation for the Causes of Saints. This Committee works to uncover and understand the life of the candidate and, ultimately, hopes to find proof that the candidate lived a life of heroic virtue — that he or she earnestly and aggressively sought to improve his or her own spirituality consistently throughout his or her life.

3. BLESSED

Once the Congregation for the Causes of Saints has ensured that there is substantial reason in the life of the candidate that he or she might be a Saint, a miracle attributed to the candidate must be observed. The Catholic Church only acknowledges a miracle as Legitimate if it is both spontaneous and enigmatic. Claims of a miracle are meticulously investigated, a process that includes an examination of the person who experiences or witnesses the miracle. Experts are also consulted to ensure that there is no physical or natural explanation for the miracle. Although miracles often affect living people, especially in the form of healings, some miracles are revealed in the mortalremains of the candidate. Such examples include incorruptibility, in which the candidate's remains do not decay, liquefaction, in which the Saint's dried blood liquefies on his or her feast day, and "Odor Of Sanctity", in which the candidate's corpse smells not of decay, but of a sweet aroma years after his or her death. If the miracle is verified, the candidate is then presented to the Pope. So begins the process of beatification in which the Pope — in his own divine influence — determines if the candidate is worthy of the title "Blessed."

4. SAINT

Once a candidate has reach the "Blessed" rung, he or she must be associated with at least one more miracle. The Pope is again presented with the miracle's evidence and determines its legitimacy. If the Pope indeed decides that the candidate is worthy of sainthood, then canonization ensues and the Catholic Church officially recognizes a new Saint.



SOCIAL INTERVENTION PROJECTS

Beyond supporting the spiritual growth of its members, Christ the King Church also continues to serve the social needs and wellbeing of the community, especially the less privileged. The following are some of the key social intervention projects carried out by the churchtowards this cause.

65TH ANNIVERSARY SIGNATORY PROJECT:

30-BED MEDICAL FACILITY AND A THEATRE FOR ST. ANDREWS CLINIC AT KORDIABE

Christ the King Catholic church is deeply concerned about the well-being of patients; by ensuring that deprived communities are provided with the high quality health care specific to their needs through health information, promotion and advocacy. It is in this regard that the Parish Pastoral Council of our Parish has sanctioned the construction of a 30-bed medical facility and a theater for St. Andrews Clinic at Kordiabe as a signatory 65th Anniversary Project. It is located in the Shai-Osu Doku District in the Greater Accra Region.

The sod cutting event took place on 27th March, 2015 at the project site; with Christ the King Catholic Church committing an initial amount of Two Hundred Thousand Ghana cedis (GHS 200,000).

As part of its corporate social responsibility, Dalex Finance and Leasing Co. Limited has made a three-year commitment of GHS 500,000 to the St Andrews Hospital Project. Mr. Kenneth Kwamina Thompson (CEO, DALEX) made the announcement when he presented an initial tranche of DALEX commitment GHS 50,000 to the Christ the King Central Harvest Planning Committee at



a ceremony at Kordiabe on Tuesday, 20th October 2015.

Furthermore, Dalex Finance and Leasing Co. Limited and Christ the King Central Harvest Planning Committee hosted a Benefit Breakfast for the St. Andrews Hospital project, as part of the 2015 Pre-harvest fundraising events. The event took place on Tuesday, 27th October, 2015 at La Villa Boutique Hotel, OSU. A handsome amount of GHS 172,000 (One hundred and seventy-two thousand cedis) was raised for the project.

St. Andrews Clinic, Kordiabe is legally owned by the Metropolitan Archdiocese of Accra. It is registered under the Christian Health Association of Ghana, accredited by the National Health Insurance Authority and run by the Sisters of the Congregation of Holy Family (CHF).

The Hospital project is currently roofed.



Vitus Dery Educational Fund

n the year 2000, Christ the King Church established The Vitus Dery Educational Fund (VDEF) to provide scholarships to brilliant but needy students. The fund was founded to honor the late Vitus Dery, an exemplary parishioner who devoted his time to preparing needy and underprivileged youth in the Christ the King Parish for the sacraments. Since its inception, the fund has supported over 60 students and pupils through various secondary and tertiary institutions including Keta Secondary School, St. Paul Technical School, Cape Coast University, Catholic Institute of Business and Technology. University of Energy and Natural Resources etc. Some of the beneficiaries have graduated and have taken up their professional roles in the community. Again in keeping up with the principles of giving back to the community, some of the beneficiaries also render services to the church during their holiday periods.

As we recognize the value of education and its power of transforming lives and making useful citizens of those who acquire it, VDEF has had and continues to have great impact on many families and students who otherwise would have no support in furthering their education.

Soup Kitchen

The Christ the King Church Soup Kitchen, founded in February 2016, is a resource for the homeless and poor, providing free breakfast meals, clothes and toiletries and creating a sense of belonging and community. The idea to start a soup kitchen in the church originated from the Parish Priest Fr. Andrew Campbell and supported by the Parish Pastoral Council (PPC). Currently the soup kitchen serves about 10 to 15 people daily between 7am and 9am. Occasionally, the Soup kitchen extends beyond the church walls; reaching out and feeding the poor and needy on the streets that are unable to come to the church premises to eat. Regular visits are organized to the marginalized, under the bridge near Nima.

In addition to providing food, the Soup Kitchen also seeks to provide assistance for the vulnerable in a variety of ways such as vocational training, medical and psychological help. These services are rendered by appropriate professionals who volunteer on specified days.

The Soup Kitchen is run by the Church administration, Welfare Committee and a team of volunteers. Support for this project comes from donations from individuals and companies. "Koko King" is currently one of the main supporters of this initiative. Volunteers and donations (both financial and in-kind) are vital to support this cause and enable the church to continue this service to the community.

Leper's Aid Committee

Leper's Aid Committee is a Non-Governmental Organization (NGO) founded and headed by Rev. Fr.

Andrew Campbell (SVD) that solicits for funds in supporting the cured and less privileged lepers in the Ghanaian communities. The plight of the lepers, due to abandonment by their families and being marginalized by society incited the establishment of the NGO.

Leper's Aid Committee has organized sponsorship walks, concerts and other fundraising activities to help raise funds for medical care, food, clothing, bills, maintenance works etc. The cured lepers are also taught how to sew, make soaps and doormats to enable them acquire survival skills and keep them off the streets.

Whiles not a direct church project, members and societies of Christ the King Parish actively support this NGO through donations, fundraising activities, volunteer work etc.



A FAMILY OF CHRIST



It's no stretch to say that a person has a serious advantage in life if they come from a loving, supportive home. Many people still succeed though they come from less-than-ideal family situations, but having our basic needs met, knowing that our parents love us and learning life lessons at home make all the challenges of day-to-day living that much easier to face.

Likely, as an adult you want a happy home for your family. This is no coincidence. God organizes us into families so that we can grow up in happiness and safety, and so that we can learn to love others selflessly—the key to true joy. Within the family is the best place to learn to love others the way Heavenly Father loves each one of us.

CHRIST THE KING INTERNATIONAL SCHOOL

"Nothing great was ever achieved without enthusiasm" (R. Emerson).

Humble Beginnings

Christ the King International School (CTKIS); founded with the motto "That all may be one"; began its journey in the educational realm on 31st January, 1956 with six pupils.

As many catholic expatriates working with the various embassies & international institutions put forward their need for an international school for their kids, the Accra Catholic Diocese listened to their plea with much enthusiasm. The Missionary Sisters **Servants of the Holy Spirit** (SSpS) were therefore tasked with the building and administration of the Christ The King International School by Father Leslie Hatfield (SVD); who was then the General Manager of Catholic Schools.

Barely three months after, the numbers increased to thirteen as some Ghanaians also wanted their kids to benefit from obtaining basic catholic education from an international school. This therefore created the need to relocate to properly built classrooms.



Subsequently, three extra classrooms were completed and inaugurated on **28**th **October, 1956** through a loan obtained from the parish, and repayment made after a year. Getting into 1957, the number of pupils had doubled in the region of fifties; majority coming from other countries.

In January, 1960 Father Anthony Bauer was transferred to take over the administration of the CTKIS; as Father Hatfield had been reassigned to the English/Irish Province of the society of the Divine Word as its Regional Supervisor. During that era, Sister Francetta Kunkel (SSpS) was made responsible for the growth, general welfare and development of the school.

As time went on, there was a need for other classroom blocks to be erected as the CTKIS grew. The sources of funds for the construction were mainly through the meagre saving of the

school, donations from friends and relatives of the SSps sisters, as well as their Congregation. The Sisters were then residing at St. Mary's Convent; Korle Gonno and commuting to the school to teach.



In February 1961, Sister Francetta and her team ensured CTKIS opened its doors to a fully furnished kindergarten; filled with children of various nationalities... excited to explore basic learning and activities together. It is quite interesting to note that the first set of Common Entrance Examination pupils; numbering seven who undertook the exams in 1961, all came out with flying colours!

Further down the line, Sister Francetta was reassigned to St.Theresa's School, North Kaneshie. **Sister Lauretta** (SSps from the Netherlands), was subsequently made in charge of CTKIS and she continued assiduously towards the expansion of the classroom blocks. She was later succeeded by **Sisters... Virginalis** (SSps from Netherlands), **Godfreda** (SSps from Filipino) and **Gerard** (SSps from USA) who stayed for a year each only.

During the tenure of **Father Harold Lauck** (SVD) as parish priest the Sisters had relocated to the front part of CTKIS (where the Common room is now). A school uniform; **yellow** in colour, was introduced by Sister Godfreda.

In 1970, **Sister Bernharda Prokesch** (from Austria) was appointed to take charge of the school. During her tenure the school uniform was amended to **maroon and white**. She also changed her name to **Sister Maria** (her baptismal name). **Rev. Father Maurice Lesage** (SVD), a retired Biology teacher from Achimota School was the parish priest during her era. He was nicknamed "The Snake Father" as he kept a variety of snakes. In 1977, Sister Maria was transferred to Madonna School

located in Koforidua; after completion of the post common entrance classroom

blocks.

Sister Mary Laureen Lahna

Sister Mary Laureen Lahnai replaced Sister Maria as the headmistress of CTKIS in 1977. Prior to her appointment, Sister Mary Laureen had taught Class one pupils from 1973 (year of joining) for three years running and thereafter was made Assistant Headmistress. Consequently, **Mrs. Patricia Quaidoo** was appointed the assistant to Sister Laureen in 1977.

In due course, CTKIS grew from strength to strength; with students graduating with top honours year after year. This was attributed to the excellent teamwork which existed between Sister Mary Laureen and Mrs. Quiadoo; working hand in hand to ensure the school was well-placed on the map of excellence. They also saw to the adoption of the Junior Secondary School Scheme. The Home science room was also built. **Rev. Father Amos Fredericks** (SVD), a retired

Headmaster of Pope John's Secondary School, was the parish priest during their era and he was later replaced by **Rev. Father Martin Wels** (SVD).





Mrs. Patricia Quaidoo Former Hedmistress

As time went on, construction began for the JSS block, but this was not completed before Sister Mary Laureen left in 1989; after she had been appointed as the SSpS Provincial for Ghana. Sister Mary Zwerina (SSpS from Austria) took charge of the running of CTKIS from 1989 but had to quit after a few years after for medical reasons. Consequently, in 1998, Mrs. Patricia Quaidoo was appointed the Headmistress of the school.

During the administration of CTKIS under the SSpS, catechism classes were prepared not only for the CTKIS children but also for other catholic children who were not attending the school. Those were memorable moments as the school choir; with their angelic voices, sung their hearts out during the sacrament of First Communion and Confirmation celebrations. In addition, during Corpus Christi processions only a limited number of congregants stayed but with the encouragement of

Sister Mary Laureen and Mrs. Quiadoo the school children got involved with the procession; thus motivating parents to partake as well.

At some point when the annual Christmas play was also introduced, the CTKIS kids were inundated with the Christmas spirit year after year! The duo did well in helping to enact the CTK hall by getting parents to annually hand out Harvest donations towards its establishment. Rev. Father Stephen Adu-Kwaning was the Parish priest during that era and he did his utmost best to support.

The Sisters of the "Handmaids of the Divine Redeemer" (HDR) subsequently took over from them afterwards. Sister Vincentia Mensah was the first HDR appointed as the headmistress in 2008. She commenced the renovation of the Kindergarten block, re-roofing of some of the deteriorated school buildings and ensured the Computer laboratory was set up for the school children. Father Prince Adelaayitar was then the parish priest of Christ the King and he left no stone unturned to assist in the development of the projects. In 2009, when Father Prince went for further studies abroad, Rev. Father Andrew Campbell took over as parish priest till date. He has been ultimately involved in the progress of the school and passionate about the inculcation of the Catholic faith in the school children.

In 2012, Sister Jesse Quist was the next HDR in whose hands the school was entrusted. She continued with the infrastructural developments commenced by her predecessor. In addition she took advantage of the prominence of Information Communications Technology and motivated teachers to create Parent/Teacher Whatsapp groups in order to give frequent feedback of the kids' performance to their parents.

In a nutshell, the HDR Sisters were also significantly involved in the growth, success and development of CTKIS by devoting all their energies in making sure the school continued to be placed on the map of excellence. When the appointment of Sister Jesse was up, Mrs. Veronica Laryea was then chosen to be the next headmistress in 2016 and has been acting in that capacity till date.

Over the past 60 years CTKIS has produced intelligent, innovative and smart graduates in various fields ranging from the Arts to the Business, Science and Environment, Health, Government, Public Services, Religion etc.

It is therefore not surprising to estimate that so many former products of the school are controlling high positions in institutions and contributing immensely to the development of our various industries in Ghana, Sub-Saharan Africa & in fact the entire world.

Whilst looking into the future, the reigning school prefect Miss Efua Aidoo-Andoh stated that the current CTKIS kids would appreciate it profoundly if:

- · The Library could be better stocked
- The playground activities could be improved upon Eg: Slides/See-Saw/Swings
- · The classrooms could be expanded

Mrs. Veronica Laryea confirmed these notions while admitting that there was a need for expansion of the classrooms to bring down the number of pupils per class. In addition there must be a boost in the outdoor/playground facilities to get the kids more involved in exuberant activities which are very key to their self-development.

She can however achieve this if we all come together, focus on obtaining these ultimate goals, and help raise enough funds to execute these projects to the best of our abilities.

We cannot complete the history of CTKIS without acknowledging all the academic and non-academic staff who have patiently been giving good quality education to our children for the past 60 years. We say Ayeekoo!

Honourable mention also goes to Mrs. Patience Tagoe, who has been a dedicated teacher at the school for the past twenty six years; thereby the current longest serving academic staff in the school.

As we celebrate "60 years of catholic education towards the development of Ghana", we urge all old students to get involved to assist in propelling the school to greater heights!



EUCHARISTIC ADORATION

THE CENTREPIECE OF SPIRITUAL GROWTH

"Of all devotions, that of adoring Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament is the greatest after the sacraments, the one dearest to God and the one most helpful to us" (St. Alphonsus Liguori)

Eucharistic Adoration is essentially an embrace with Jesus in which I say to him: "I am yours, and I ask you, please stay with me always".(Pope Benedict XVI)

The Eucharistic adoration is a practice in the Roman Catholic Church; in which the Blessed Sacrament is exposed and adored by the faithful. It is the act of worshiping God as He is present in the consecrated Eucharist. Since the last Supper, when Jesus broke the bread and distributed the wine saying, "This is my Body" and "This is my Blood", Catholics have believed that the bread and wine are no longer merely baked wheat and fermented grape juice, but the actual living presence of the Second Person of the Trinity.

Spending time before the Blessed Sacrament, in prayer and devotion, is exactly the same as spending time before the living God. Adoration is a sign of devotion to and worship of Jesus Christ, who is present Body, Blood and Soul, and Divinity, under the appearance of the consecrated host exposed in monstrance.

Adoration occurs whenever someone kneels in front of a tabernacle that contains the Blessed Sacrament, genuflects towards a tabernacle, bows before receiving the Blessed Sacrament at Mass, or, in a more focused way, when the Blessed Sacrament is exposed for adoration.

As devotion, Eucharistic adoration and meditation are more than merely looking at the Blessed Sacrament, but is a continuation of what was celebrated in the Holy Eucharist. From a theological point of view, the adoration is a form of latria, based on the tenet of the presence of Christ in the Blessed Sacrament.

Adoration performed in the presence of the Eucharist outside of Mass is called Eucharistic Meditation. When exposure and adoration of the Eucharist is constant (twenty-four hours a day), it is called Perpetual Adoration. Perpetual Adoration is a Eucharistic devotion whereby members of a given parish (or other entity) unite in taking hours of adoration before the Most Blessed Sacrament (in most cases, exposed), both during the day and throughout the night, seven days a week.

In a Monastery or Convent, it is done by the resident Monks or Nuns. In a Parish, it is normally done by volunteer parishioners since the 20th Century.

PROMOTING EUCHARISTIC ADORATION

Pope John Paul II stated "the Eucharist is our priceless treasure and he went on to say" I have a burning desire to be honoured in the Blessed Sacrament". Building on the teaching of his predecessors, John Paul II has come to be known as the Pope of the Real Presence. In one document and address after another, he has repeated what needs repetition for the sake of emphasis: "The Eucharist, in the Mass and outside of the Mass, is the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ, and is therefore deserving of the worship that is given to the living God, and to Him alone" (Opening address in Ireland, Phoenix Park, September 29, 1979).

As a parish, Christ the King Catholic Church thanks God for the wonderful treasure and gift of the adoration chapel. Thousands of worshipers come regularly, both young and old, to adore Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament.

- 1. He is really there!
 "I myself am the Living Bread come down from Heaven." (Jn. 6:35)
- 2. Day and night Jesus dwells in the Blessed Sacrament because of his Infinite love for you!

SEVEN BIBLICAL REASONS FOR WANTING TO SPEND ONE HOUR WITH JESUS IN THE BLESSED SACRAMENT

"Behold I will be with you always even to the end of the world," because "I have loved you with an everlasting love, and constant is my affection for you." (Mt 28:20; Jer. 31:3)

3. The specific way that Jesus asks you to love Him in return is to spend one quiet hour with Him in the Blessed Sacrament.

"Where your treasure is, there is your heart...."
"Could you not watch one hour with Me?" (Mt 6:21; 26:40)

4. When you look upon the Sacred Host, you look upon Jesus, the Son of God.

"Indeed, this is the will of my Father, that everyone who looks upon the Son and believes in Him shall have eternal life. Him I will raise up on the last day." (Jn 6:40)

5. Each moment that you spend in His Eucharistic Presence will increase His Divine Life within you and deepen your personal relationship and friendship with Him.

"I have come that you may have life, and have it more abundantly." "I am the Vine and you are the branches. Whoever remains in me and I in him shall bear much fruit because without me, you can do nothing." (Jn. 15:5)

6. Each hour you spend with Jesus will deepen His Divine Peace in your heart.



HISTORY

Jubilee Year of Mercy Shrine

On 2nd January, 2016, under the auspices of Pope Francis, our Lady of Fatima Grotto was declared as one of the five Grottos in the Catholic Archdiocese of Accra designated as "Jubilee Year of Mercy Shrines". With special graces, one or a group of people can go to the Grotto at any time of the day throughout the year for personal prayers. Special indulgences have been attached to it so that one may receive special favours from God whenever one visits there and pray for oneself, families, and loved ones; and even for the souls of the faithful departed.

SCHEDULE OF ACTIVITIES

GROTTO MASS

First Saturdays of every month and all other Marian feast days: The devotion begins with Rosary procession and Confessions at 4 pm. This is followed by Holy Mass, Consecration of participants and families to the Eucharistic Heart of Jesus and

Sorrowful and Immaculate Heart of Mary and finally, blessing of articles of faith (water, scapula, etc.) by the Main Celebrant.

OUR LADY REQUESTED FIRST SATURDAY DEVOTIONS

The world is becoming increasingly de-Christianized. Abortion, now known as "womens' rights." Euthanasia, now known as "mercy killing." Same-sex "marriage," now considered as a "civil right." Violence, sexual perversity, body mutilation, seeking altered states of consciousness, the occult...... What is a Christian to do? The answer was given to us in 1917 by Our Lady at a little known place called Fatima. She requested what are now known as the First Saturday Devotions to make reparation for blasphemies and offenses against her Immaculate Heart and for world peace.

This devotion has four parts – all four should be made in a spirit of reparation for blasphemy and ingratitude and for peace in the world. First, one should go to confession, generally eight days before or after the First Saturday of the month; Second, one should receive Holy Communion on the First Saturday of the month; Third, recite five decades of the Rosary; and fourth, meditate for 15 minutes on the mysteries of the Holy Rosary." There are great benefits for those who comply with this request. Our Lady told Sister Lucia, she would "assist at the hour of our death with the graces necessary for salvation, all those who on the first Saturdays of five consecutive months confess, receive Holy Communion, pray the Rosary, and keep me company for a quarter of an hour meditating on the 15 mysteries with the intention of offering reparation."

Many ask why Our Lady asked her children to observe FIVE first Saturdays. Our Lady told Sister Lucia the five Saturdays are to make reparation for the five kinds of offenses and blasphemies uttered against her Immaculate Heart. The offenses are 1.) against her Immaculate Conception, 2.) against her virginity, 3.) against her Divine Maternity, 4.) by those who openly seek to foster in the hearts of children indifference, or even hatred, for this Immaculate Mother, and 5.) by those who directly outrage her Holy image.

What if you've already made the Five First Saturdays?

Should you do it again?

There is always a need for reparation. Although we can trust in the promises of Our Lady that we have satisfied her desires for ourselves personally, nonetheless, it will still be beneficial for us in making reparation for sins which continue against her Immaculate Heart and for obtaining world peace.

YOUTH FORMATION AND DEVELOPMENT

REMEMBER YOUR CREATOR IN THE DAYS OF YOUR YOUTH (ECCLESIASTES 12:1).

he youth and children in every institution indicate the sustainability of that institution. So youth formation and activities has been an area of keen interest in Christ the King Church. The Sunday School System caters for the children who are 8 years and below. Sunday school teachers and animators ensure that the children are given appropriate teaching suited to their ages and level of understanding. They also help them gradually integrate themselves into attending mass. The Youth Mass is organised for children and youth who are communicants. It is organised in a youth friendly atmosphere and the homilies are tailored to the youth audience. To achieve growth in the youth front, we have sought to grow the youth groups as well as put in place targeted programs by the PYC which would meet the diverse needs and interest of the youth.

There are currently nine (9) youth groups with representation at the Parish Youth Council (PYC). They are Angelic Choir, Catholic Organization for Social and Religious Advancement (COSRA), Catholic Students' Union (CASU), Catholic Youth Organization (CYO), Knights and Ladies of the Altar (KNOLTA), Young Legionaries, Young Christian Workers (YCW), Youth Lectors, and Youth Ushers.









Of these, the Angelic Choir, KNOLTA, Youth Lectors and Youth Ushers provide the opportunity for the youth to play active roles in the rich liturgy of the church. These groups help the youth drink deep from the liturgy of the church and help them develop skills that they can be utilized in the church as they grow up.

CYO, with its cultural slant, discipline and activity oriented programmes appeals to children in the church. The Young Legionaries also provide the youth with a group focused on a Marian spirituality and acts of charity. Mr. Peter Tamberson, (Father of the Year, 2014), has been a great source of inspiration for the group, leading them in their various apostolates to the sick, the street children, the prostitutes and others who are marginalized.

CASU seeks to give holistic training to students in secondary and tertiary institutions. These youth are regularly being challenged by their peers in school on their Catholic faith. Also, they are in a time of growth, questioning, and beginning to make life's choices. CASU therefore seeks to accompany and guide them throughout this changing phase of their life.

For young adults, the YCW and COSRA are available. This is a period of great change and more life changing choices as regards, further education, work, marriage and sharing one's faith. Such people would want to feel responsible and invest their energies in a worthwhile venture. These two groups therefore concentrate on these areas and more in order to plan for the needs of the young adults.

In addition to the above, there is the choreography group "Vessels of Love". It nurtures the creative ability of youth who are talented in dancing. They succeed in communicating divine truths through the choreography as well as entertain their audience.

The Vocations Club is actively inspiring and guiding young ones who feel called by God, to become priests, brothers and sisters. Through talks, pilgrimages, times of prayer and discernment, the club encourages the priesthood and religious life as a positive option. It also promotes a healthy appreciation of the marriage vocation.

There are however other societies which are yet to have representation on the PYC, such as, the Cadets and Junior Auxiliary of Saint John International, Junior Knights and Ladies of Marshall, and the League Of Tarcisians. Their mother organisations are working tremendously hard to see to their success and integration into the general youth front.

As we celebrate 65 years as a parish, we must recognize the efforts of all the youth in contributing their quota to the growth of this parish. Their contributions in the life of the church have been tremendous. The prospects are great, because Christ the King abounds in resources. Once these resources are tapped into and channeled to make a positive impact on the youth, the Church would have a bright future. In a real way, the words of Christ must guide youth formation, 'let the little children come to me do not stop them for the Kingdom of God belongs to such as these' (Matthew 19:14).

May the Lord bless the youth of this parish as we have our 65th anniversary celebrations, so that they will draw strength from Jesus Christ our King in order to make His church grow.

Conferment of the Knighthood of St. Gregory the Great




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PEARLS OF WISDOM

A Conversation with Mama Catherine

How old are you Mama Catherine?

I am Ninety-four (94) years old

Tell us about yourself Mama Catherine?

Originally, I come from Cameroon but am a Ghanaian by marriage. I met my Ghanaian husband, who had been working for UAC there. My parents did not initially want me to marry him. However, seeing that he was the one after my heart, in the end they agreed. I got married when I was eighteen (18) years; and have been blessed with three children - two girls and a boy. In 1941, my husband and I relocated to Ghana. My children attended school whilst I traded in wax prints and cloth. My husband passed away after almost fifty years of marriage and I have clung to the Lord ever since.

How long have you been a Parishioner at Christ the King?

A very long time. Over forty years if I recall correctly. I used to attend the Catholic Church at 37 Military Hospital but there were too many distractions. I had no idea that there was a parish here until I chanced upon it one day and decided to regularly attend Mass here.

How was your first day in a Catholic Church?

Terrible. The first day I entered Christ the King yard I saw the Sacred Heart Statue and I was deeply moved. I did not understand it. It was as if I was being drawn to it by a strong force that I couldn't control. I felt such peace and I just wanted to remain here. My whole life changed from that point.

Please tell us more on how your life changed?

It became my practice to visit the Sacred Heart Statue in front of the Church and say a short prayer before entering the Church building itself. A few months later, I started regular attendance; I visited the Sacred Heart statue as usual and felt that strong force again; even stronger than before. As I stood facing the statue, something turned my head towards the Grotto. I felt compelled to go to the Grotto instead; and immediately upon entering I saw the image of the Mother Mary. I couldn't believe my eyes; my heart and soul were deeply moved. I told Father Wells what I had seen and he took me to see the Nuncio who prayed with me.





You said that the first day was a terrible day? How so?

I said that because my whole life changed. I became much closer to God. I started praying all the time and praying in tongues. Since that, I have never missed a day of Mass, unless I'm out of the country. I wake up at 2 am daily to prepare for Divine Mercy Prayers. By 4 am I am here at the Adoration Chapel Praying. Even when I am ill and sleeping, something wakes me up and strengthens me to prepare for Mass in the morning.

How have you been serving in the Church?

Since my encounter with Mother Mary, I have devoted myself to praying the Rosary as well as mobilizing and teaching others about the significance of the Rosary. We organize and hold Vigils, prayer sessions with the Rosary in my house. Now we have the Adoration Chapel where we start prayers at 4 am everyday before attending Mass at 6 .30 am. Wednesdays are devoted to prayers at the Grotto; and I never miss out on that either.

How do you think the younger parishioners at Christ the King can learn from you?

The world is moving at a faster pace, and the younger people are going along with this speed. Nothing is better than making God the first choice of your life and going at His pace. Before doing anything ask God for His guidance and blessing and keep asking until you have an answer. Respect yourself and others by trying to understand the meaning or purpose God has for your life. Be your real self and not what you think others need to see.

As a Christian, you need to surrender all to God. Don't think you have to do certain things before getting closer to God. Go as you are, confess your sins and open your heart to receive God. Make it a point to actively seek God and know Him and you will attain inner peace and happiness. The ways of the world are many and so are the temptations. We chase after wealth and status but when you come to love God, all these become irrelevant. God will never neglect a believer who trusts in Him. Leave everything to God and He will give you abundant graces. Do not rely on the priest or others but go straight to God and speak to Him.

A Conversation with Mrs Emily Sowah

(Affectionately called Grandma)

AGE: 83 (Born on November 9, 1932)

Have you been a Catholic all throughout your life?

No! I'm a convert from Methodism

How and when did you become a Catholic?

Long time ago I was asked if I would ever become a Catholic... Then I said no. Become a Catholic?... But here I am.

One day after I had been accompanying my husband, who is also a convert (1983) from the Methodist faith, to Mass for a while, he asked me if I was going to be following him all the time **for nothing.** I, therefore, decided to join officially. Father Wels said I would have to take Catechism for three months then. So, I joined the Secondary students during their long vacation for catechism. I was received first, on 13th of August 1984, and then later confirmed with the students on a Tuesday evening.

How was your first day in a Catholic Church?

Don't laugh. I remember one day when it came to the peace handshake. I thought my husband needed something from me when he stretched forth his hand. Then he said no, that's the practice here!!!!.

What about your children, are they also Catholics?

Four are Catholics but one is still a Methodist. I know that one day he will also convert. We left them to make their own decisions. Those who are Catholics also converted but did not all come at the same time. The one who is a Methodist brings me to the Adoration Chapel every morning and he stays there for adoration and leaves at 6 am for work.

Human beings do not convert it is God who converts. Just sow! It is God who waters.

What has kept you on from 1984 to date as a convert?

Mainly, the beliefs and practices of the Church have kept me in the Church. I did not know about Confession until I joined the Church, so when I heard about it at Catechism I was really touched by that. Also, my personal interest in the spiritual well-being of the younger ones has also been a factor. I did not get this in my former church.



How have you been serving in the church?

As a Legionary, I help with the Lectors at the Youth Mass. After Mass we sit them down and take the readings for the subsequent Sunday and have some Bible studies including the teachings of the Church. I was also a Catechist for a brief period but even after I had stopped Fr. Wells occasionally brought in one or two who needed special attention.

Have there been any challenges?

The condition in the world itself has made parents, children, everyone to only concentrate on passing their exams and forgetting about scripture. So it is very difficult to get children to join the Ministry. Some parents do not cooperate. So even sitting after Mass is trouble .There are so many excuses; "I am going somewhere". "My child will be writing exams." You need a lot of patience. Many of our children do not know scripture. You ask them to open to Mathew and they cannot. It is embarrassing sometimes. A person in the Secondary School! That is why people say Catholics do not know scripture. We have a real problem on our hand.

Parents must help their children to participate in church activities especially with the lectors' ministry. They should have time to pray and read scripture with their children.

As a Youth Mentor what do you think is driving the youth away from the Catholic Church?

They say that Mass is not lively. They leave the Church for these prosperity Churches. Sometimes they are enticed with promises here and there. Some are also yearning to know scripture. We must accept this and find remedy.

What can be done to curb this problem?

The idea of Sunday school is good. Children who have not reached the age of understanding the Mass or are not qualified should go to Sunday school. We must be firm about this. Parents must cooperate.

Please any advice for the youth?

- * God first, they shouldn't go chasing after material things.
- *They should study scripture and they should be prayerful.
- * There can't be any short cut to success.

"Think of what you can offer the Church, what you can do for the Church to grow instead of always thinking about what you can get from the Church. The youth should try and contribute to the growth of the Church, don't wait and get to my age and say had I known. While you are still strong and well make good use of your time."

Are there any regrets at age 83?

Yes I believe I could have done more, especially with the Legion of Mary.

While you are still strong and well make good use of your time, don't wait to grow old and say had I known.

She is very funny as well. "I am sorry you have to interview a talkative. Once a teacher, always a talkative", she says.



SIGNIFICANCE OF CHURCH DEDICATION

Introduction

The rite for the dedication of a Church and an Altar is rightly considered among the most Solemn Liturgical services of the Catholic Church. A Church is the place where the Christian community is gathered to hear the Word of God, to offer intercession and praise to Him, and above all, to celebrate the Holy mysteries. It is the place where the Holy Sacrament of the Eucharist is kept. Thus, it stands as a special kind of image of the Church itself, which is God's temple built from living stones. The altar of a Church, around which the holy people of God gather to take part in the Lord's sacrifice and to be refreshed at the heavenly meal, stands as a sign of Christ Himself, who is the priest, the victim, and the altar of His own sacrifice.

The dedication is done during the celebration of Mass during which the liturgical texts of the day could be omitted and texts proper to the rite are used for both the liturgy of the word and the liturgy of the Eucharist.

The Mass which commences with a bare altar will at the appropriate time be anointed, incensed, covered and lighted up. These rites express in visible signs several aspects of the invisible work that the Lord accomplishes through the Church in its celebration of the divine mysteries, especially the Eucharist.

Entrance into the Church

The rite of dedication begins with the entrance into the Church. All assemble in a nearby Church or other suitable place, from which the Bishop, the Ministers, and the Congregation proceed to the Church to be dedicated, praying and singing.

Two rituals most significant in the entrance into the Church.

- 1. The handing over of the Church: representative of those who have been involved in the building of the Church hand over to the Bishop.
- 2. The sprinkling of the Church: the Bishop blesses water and with it sprinkles the people, who are the spiritual temple, then the walls of the Church and finally, the altar. The use of water for blessing is found in the book of Ezekiel 36: 24-28

Liturgy of the word

Three readings are used in the liturgy of the word. After the readings the Bishop gives the homily, in which he explains the biblical readings and the meaning of the dedication of the Church. The profession of faith is always said. The general intercessions are omitted, since the Litany of the Saints is sung in their place.

Depositing of the Relics of the Saints.

The relics of a martyr are deposited after the singing of the Litany of the Saints, to signify that the sacrifice of the members has its source in the sacrifice of the Head. When relics of a martyr are not available, relics of another saint may be deposited in the altar (Revelations 6:9-11)

Prayer of Dedication

The celebration of the Eucharist is the most important and the one necessary rite for the dedication of the Church. In accordance with the tradition of the Church in both East and West, a special prayer of dedication is also said. This prayer is a sign of the intention to dedicate the Church building to the Lord for all times and a petition for His blessing

Rites of Anointing, Incensing, Covering and Lighting the Altar

The rites of Anointing, Incensing, Covering and Lighting the altar express in visible signs several aspects of the invisible work that the Lord accomplishes through the Church in its celebration of the divine mysteries, especially the Eucharist.

Anointing the Altar and Church Walls

The anointing with Chrism makes the altar a symbol of Christ, who, before all others, is and is called "The Anointed One"; for the Father anointed Him with the Holy Spirit and constituted Him the High Priest so that on the altar of His body He might offer the sacrifice of His life for the salvation of all.

The anointing of the Church signifies that it is given over entirely and perpetually to Christian worship. In keeping with Liturgical tradition, there are twelve anointings, or, where it is more convenient, four, as a symbol that the Church is an image of the holy city of Jerusalem.

Incensing the Altar, the Congregation and Nave of the Church

Incense is burned on the altar to signify that Christ's sacrifice, there perpetuated in mystery, ascends to God as an odor of sweetness and also to signify that the people's prayers rise up pleasing and acceptable, reaching the throne of God.

The Incensation of the nave of the Church indicates that the dedication makes the Church a house of prayer, but the people of God are incensed first, because they are living temple in which each fanciful member is a spiritual altar (Rom 12:1).

Covering of the Altar

The covering of the altar indicates that the Christian altar is the altar of the Eucharistic sacrifice and the table of the Lord; around it, priests and people, by one and the same rite but with a difference of function, celebrate the memorial of Christ's death and resurrection and partake of His supper. For this reason the altar is prepared as the table of the sacrificial banquet and adorned as for a feast. Thus the dressing of the altar clearly signifies that it is the Lord's table at which all God's people joyously meet to be refreshed with divine food, namely, the body and blood of Christ sacrificed.

Lightning of the Altar

The lighting of the altar, which is followed by the lighting of the Church, reminds us that Christ is "a light to enlighten the nations" (see Luke 2:32); His brightness shines out in the Church and through it in the whole human family.

THE ESSENCE OF REDEDICATION OF CHRIST THE KING CHURCH

In accordance with Canon Law 1212, "an altar loses its dedication or blessing if they have been in great measure destroyed or if they have been permanently made over to secular usage whether by decree of the competent Ordinary or simply fact"; the replacement of the existing altar with a new one nullified the first dedication. Once a Church building and its altar have been dedicated they remain so until the dedication is sullied by conditions specified by Canon Law 1212.

Our Church building and its altar were dedicated to the service of God in October 1967.

With the increase in membership of the Church, the existing altar was considered too small for concelebrating of Mass by many priests, calling for the need for replacement. The inevitability for rededication of our Church and its altar has, therefore, been occasioned by the replacement of the existing altar with a completely new one. As the ambo and baptismal font were also replaced at the same time, by extension they too need to be rededicated alongside the new altar.

Choice of Day for Rededication of Christ the King Church

There are clear directions within the Catholic Church for choosing the day for the dedication. For example the day chosen should be a day "when the people can be present in large numbers, especially a Sunday. Since the theme of the dedication pervades the entire rite, the dedication of a Church may not take place on days on which it is altogether improper to disregard the mystery then being commemorated such as the Easter triduum, Christmas, Epiphany, Ascension, Pentecost, Ash Wednesday, the weekdays of Holy Week, and All Souls."

The day on which a Church is dedicated is, therefore, kept as a solemnity in that Church. May 22, 2016, the day chosen for our dedication happens not only to be a Sunday, but Trinity Sunday in the Liturgical Calendar of the Church and falls exactly on the 65th anniversary of the Parish.

HANDMAIDS OF THE **DIVINE REDEEMER (HDR)**



The Handmaids of the Divine Redeemer of Accra (HDR) was founded by Bishop Joseph Oliver Bowers[†], (SVD) Divine Word Missionary, in 1957.

They are an indigenous Diocesan Congregation for Catholic Religious Women. The HDRs are from across different cultural backgrounds and have diverse professional careers. The HDR have different Apostolate in different parishes. With the motto: Saved to Serve, the handmaids having been saved look up with humility to Mary to serve and share in the passion of the Devine Redeemer. Their name summarizes the qualities which should motivate the members in exercising their Charism of practical service. They have their Mother House still located at Agomanya, their Novitiate now at Koforidua, their Postulancy at Akwatia and their Generalate at Airport-West, Accra. There are 7 convents in Accra now.

They continue to do these and much more to support the parish and the entire church community.
