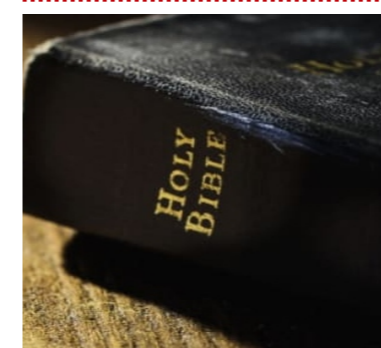

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Dear Parishioners,

Go and Do Likewise

The gospel today calls on us to reflect on one of the famous stories in the Holy Bible, the story of the Good Samaritan. The scholar asked, *Teacher what must I do to inherit eternal life?* Though he asked the question to test Jesus, Jesus took the opportunity to teach eternal truth. By his method, Jesus encourages us to transcend the malice and limitations exhibited by people we encounter and instead seize the moment to make an impression on their lives.

The story itself offers a lot of insights. I share with you excerpts of Pope Francis' reflection on the Good Samaritan in his encyclical: ON FRATERNITY AND SOCIAL FRIENDSHIP (no 69-72 and 79). According to Pope Francis, the parable, "evokes the interior struggle that each of us experiences as we gradually come to know ourselves through our relationships with our brothers and sisters. Sooner or later, we will all encounter a person who is suffering... Each day we have to decide whether to be Good Samaritans or indifferent bystanders. And if we extend our gaze to the history of our own lives and that of the entire world, all of us are, or have been, like each of the characters in the parable. All of us have in ourselves something of the wounded man, something of the robber, something of the passers-by, and something of the Good Samaritan.

It is remarkable how the various characters in the story change, once confronted by the painful sight of the poor man on the roadside. The distinctions between Judean and Samaritan, priest and merchant, fade into insignificance. Now there are only two kinds of people: those who care for someone who is hurting and those who pass by; those who bend down to help and those who look the other way and hurry off. Here, all our distinctions, labels and masks fall away: it is the moment of truth. Will we bend down to touch and heal the wounds of others? Will we bend down and help another to get up? This is today's challenge, and we should not be afraid to face it.

The story of the Good Samaritan is constantly being repeated. We can see this clearly as social and political inertia is turning many parts of our world into a desolate byway, even as domestic and international disputes and the robbing of opportunities are leaving great numbers of the marginalized stranded on the roadside. In his parable, Jesus does not offer alternatives; he does not ask what might have happened had the injured man or the one who helped him yielded to anger or a thirst for revenge.

The Samaritan who stopped along the way departed without expecting any recognition or gratitude. His effort to assist another person gave him great satisfaction in life and before his God, and thus became a duty. All of us have a responsibility for the wounded, those of our own people and all the peoples of the earth. Let us care for the needs of every man and woman, young and old, with the same fraternal spirit of care and closeness that marked the Good Samaritan."

FAITH CORNER

THE THEOLOGICAL VIRTUE OF HOPE

According to the Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC 1817), hope is the theological virtue by which we desire the kingdom of heaven and eternal life as our happiness, placing our trust in Christ's promises and relying not on our own strength, but on the help of the grace of the Holy Spirit. Buoyed up by hope, the Christian is preserved from selfishness and led to the happiness that flows from charity. Christian hope unfolds from the beginning of Jesus' preaching in the proclamation of the beatitudes. The beatitudes raise our hope toward heaven as the new Promised Land; they trace the path that leads through the trials that await the disciples of Jesus.

Hope in gospel faith is not just a vague feeling that things will work out, for it is evident that things will not just work out. Rather, hope is the conviction, against a great deal of data, that God is tenacious and persistent in overcoming the deathliness of the world, that God intends joy and peace. Christians find compelling evidence, in the story of Jesus, that Jesus, with great persistence and great vulnerability, everywhere he went, turned the enmity of society toward a new possibility, turned the sadness of the world toward joy, introduced a new regime where the dead are raised, the lost are found, and the displaced are brought home again.

Hope is the patient and trustful willingness to live without full closure, without resolution, and still be content and even happy because our satisfaction is now at another level, and our Source is beyond ourselves. We are able to trust that Christ will come again, just as Christ has come into our past, into our private dilemmas, and into our suffering world. When someone hopes for something, he must know within reason that there is a possibility that he will achieve his goal. One may say, can the Christian obtain the Kingdom of God? If he cannot, his hope and prayers would be a waste of time. The assurance of the Christian is his faith and hope in the Words of Jesus. Jesus said: "Fear not little flock, for it is your Father's good pleasure to give you the Kingdom." [Lk. 12:32]
